


We lift them to the Lord.

Come Holy Spirit.



Lucy, martyr, died 304

Friday, December 13, 2024

Lucy was a young Christian of Sicily who was martyred during the persecutions under Emperor Diocletian. Her celebration became particularly important in Sweden and Norway, perhaps because the



feast of Lucia (whose name means "light") originally fell on the shortest day of the year.

John of the Cross, renewer of the church, died 1591

John was a member of the Carmelite monastic order, and worked to reform it. His writings reflect a deep interest in mystical thought and meditation.

Chrismon Narrations

Trinity

We place these symbols of the Trinity on our tree to remind us that the One God is in three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Iota

We place this symbol on our tree to remind us that the name of Jesus means Savior.

Angel

We place an angel on our tree to remind us that when Jesus was born angels revealed the news to Mary, Joseph, and shepherds.

Fish

We place the fish on our tree to remind us that Jesus fed over 5000 with fish and bread; that he is the Bread of Life.

Crook

On our tree we place the Shepherd's Crook between the symbols of the Alpha and Omega to remind us that Jesus is our eternal Good Shepherd.

Cross

The cross on our tree reminds us of the love of God and the power of Christ's cross.

Thorns

We place a Crown of Thorns on our tree to remind us what Jesus wore while on the cross.

Butterfly

We place the butterfly on our tree because the butterfly is a symbol of resurrection and the new life that Jesus brings.

Lights

Lights have been placed on our tree to remind us that Jesus is our Light and our Life.

King's Crown

A King's Crown adorns the top of our tree to remind us that Jesus is the King of Heaven and Earth.
