

INTRODUCTION TO EASTER WORSHIP

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Today, we gather in joy to celebrate the victory of Jesus Christ over sin and death. Our readings proclaim the heart of our faith: Peter's testimony in Acts declares that Jesus is Lord of all, the fulfillment of God's promise to bring salvation to the world. The psalm celebrates God's steadfast love and the joy of this day. Paul reminds us in 1 Corinthians that Christ's resurrection is the beginning of our own, securing the hope of eternal life. In the Gospel of Luke, the women at the tomb discover that Jesus is no longer among the dead but has risen. As we worship this morning, we rejoice in Christ's triumph and the promise of new life for all who believe. Alleluia! Christ is risen indeed!

Zadok the Priest Trumpet Tune George Handel (1685-1759) Jeremiah Clarke (1674-1707)


George Frideric Handel and Jeremiah Clarke were both influential Baroque composers, though their careers followed different trajectories, and there is no known direct connection between them. Handel, a German-born composer who became a dominant figure in English music, is best known for his operas, oratorios (Messiah), and royal ceremonial works (Zadok the Priest). His music shaped the development of choral and orchestral traditions, leaving a lasting legacy in both sacred and secular realms. Clarke, an English composer and organist, was highly regarded for his trumpet music, particularly Trumpet Tune and Prince of Denmark's March, which became staples of royal and ceremonial occasions. While Clarke's influence was more localized to English court and church music, both composers contributed to the grandeur and ceremonial power of Baroque music, emphasizing bold harmonies, regal melodies, and dramatic contrasts that continue to inspire musicians today.

THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 10:34-43

Peter's sermon, delivered at the home of Cornelius, a Roman army officer, is a summary of the essential message of Christianity: Everyone who believes in Jesus, whose life, death, and resurrection fulfilled the words of the prophets, receives forgiveness of sins through his name.

Peter began to speak to [the people]: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Paul describes the consequences of the resurrection, including the promise of new life in Christ to a world that has been in bondage to death. He celebrates the destruction of evil and the establishment of God's victorious rule over all.

If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.



GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

The Congregation stands

Pastor The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the twenty-fourth chapter.



Evidently expecting to find Jesus' corpse, some of the women among his followers go to the tomb with embalming spices. After a perplexing encounter with the empty tomb and angelic visitors, the women become the first to proclaim the amazing news of resurrection.

On the first day of the week, at early dawn, [the women] came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." Then they remembered his words, and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.





Congregation Amen. Come, Holy Spirit.



THE POSTLUDE

Carillon de Westminster

LOUIS VIERNE (1870-1937)

Louis Vierne was a towering figure in French organ music, serving as the principal organist at Notre-Dame de Paris for 37 years and composing some of the most expressive and technically demanding works for the instrument. A student of César Franck and Charles-Marie Widor, Vierne expanded the French symphonic organ tradition, blending rich harmonic colors, sweeping melodic lines, and dramatic contrasts. His compositions, particularly his six Organ Symphonies, remain central to the organ repertoire.

One of his most famous pieces, **Carillon de Westminster** originated as an improvisation, showcasing his remarkable ability to spontaneously develop complex musical ideas. Vierne took the famous Westminster chimes—the melody associated with Big Ben—and transformed them into a grand and virtuosic organ work. Recognizing the strength of the improvisation, he later wrote it down and refined it into the final version, which builds from a simple statement of the chime motif into a swirling, triumphant toccata. This ability to craft intricate, spontaneous music was a hallmark of Vierne's artistry and contributed to his lasting influence in the world of organ composition.


